### Background

The FY 2020 House Infrastructure Budget appropriates a total of \$199,136,057 from the Rebuild Iowa Infrastructure Fund. This leaves an ending balance of \$598,061. The bill contains \$98.3 million in new appropriations.

#### **This Bill makes the following appropriations after FY 2020:**

**Iowa State Vet Lab:** \$12,500,000 in FY 2021, \$12,500,000 in FY 2022, \$12,500,000 in FY 23, \$12,500,000 in FY 24.

**Demolition and Vacant Building Remediation Funds:** \$2,000,000 in FY 21 and FY 22 for both building demolition and vacant building remediation for state owned buildings.

**Major Maintenance:** \$20,000,000 in FY 2021, \$20,000,000 in FY 2022 and \$20,000,000 in FY 2023.

**Capitol Maintenance:** \$500,000 in FY 21-FY 24

**Iowa State Student Innovation Center:** \$10,000,000 in FY 21 and \$7,000,000 in FY 22

**State Fair 4H Building:** \$4 million in FY 21

The legislation fully funds the \$42,000,000 to the Environment First Fund and the \$3 million to the State Housing Trust Fund.

**Major Maintenance.** Major Maintenance funding is used for a wide range of repairs in State buildings. In FY 20 the legislature is appropriating \$20 million for major maintenance. There is language in the bill to limit the amount spent to repair the roof of the historical building at no more \$3,300,000 a year.

**Routine Maintenance.** There is an additional \$2 million appropriation to the routine maintenance fund that is created in the House Infrastructure budget. This is in addition to the annual appropriation of \$2 million from RIIF. The fund is under the control of DAS.

**Capitol Building Maintenance.** This fund will receive an annual \$500,000 appropriation from RIIF under the control of the Legislative Council. Money from this fund can be used for projects on the state Capitol and the Ola Babcock Building.

**Water Quality.** The funding is for prioritized watersheds to implement conservation practices that will reduce nutrient transport to bodies of water and maintains the \$5.2 million FY 20.

**Ag Drainage Wells.** The fund was established in 1997 to protect drinking water aquifers by cost-sharing with land owners to close agricultural drainage wells and develop alternative drainage outlets to surface streams or install alternative management practices. There are currently 14 sites that remain open, which the Department estimates they can close prior to FY 2021. The legislation maintains the \$1.875 million in FY 20.

**Renewable Fuels Infrastructure Fund.** This appropriation will help provide financial assistance to owners or operators of a retail motor fuel site or a biodiesel terminal that want to convert over their equipment to store or dispense renewable fuels.

**Broadband.** This \$5 million appropriation is used for grants to help with broadband expansion. This program was created in 2015. Criteria for grant awards include existing broadband availability, the percentage of potential area users that will be affected, the economic impact of the broadband expansion, the project budget, and the match provided, and other criteria deemed relevant. The State share of the project may not exceed 15.00% of the communication service provider’s total project cost.

**Capitals Request.** This new \$150,000 appropriation will go to a fire suppression system for the sixth judicial district community-based corrections residential facility.

**Great Places.** The appropriation maintains the \$1 million funding level for FY 20. All projects that receive grants must meet the criteria of vertical infrastructure. Some of the projects that are approved are park creation, local historical building renovations, expansion of museums, and recreational trails.

**Rural YMCAs.** The population requirement will be 28,000 or less for a YMCA to receive a grant from this appropriation. Funds will be used for grants to help with infrastructure improvements, the bill provides an appropriation of \$250,000.

**Community Attraction and Tourism.** These grants are awarded on a competitive basis to communities for local attractions and must meet the definition of vertical infrastructure. Projects are approved through the Enhance Iowa Board. The bill maintains \$5 million in funding.

**Regional Sports.** This \$500,000 appropriation for FY 20, is equally distributed to regional sports authority districts certified by Iowa Economic Development Authority. The funding is used for promotional purposes at the 10 sports authorities around the state to market their communities and sporting events and to attract sports teams to the communities.

**World Food Prize.** A \$300,000 appropriation for the Borlaug/ Ruan Scholar program is an international program that provides high school students with experiences of working with scientists and policy makers at research centers in Africa, Asia, Latin America, and the Middle East.

**Vacant State Building Demolition Fund.** This is a new fund which receives \$2 million created in the state treasury under the control of the Economic Development Authority. Funds in the account will be used for grants to demolish vacant buildings owned by the state that are no longer used for a state purpose.

**Vacant State Building Remediation Fund.** . This is a new fund created in the state treasury, receiving \$2 million, under the control of the Economic Development Authority. Funds in the account will be used for a loan program for the rehabilitation or redevelopment of vacant buildings owned by the state but no longer used for a state purpose.

**Nursing Home Improvements.** The Nursing Home Financial Assistance Program is in Iowa Code and was established in the 2008 Infrastructure Act to support the appropriate number of nursing facility beds and to remain in compliance with applicable health and safety regulations. The programs receives \$500,000 in FY 20.

**ILEA Building Remodel.** This \$10.8 million appropriation will support building and facility improvements to the Law Enforcement Academy.

**State Park Infrastructure.** Some of the work from this \$2 million appropriation includes: upgrading drinking water systems, constructing restrooms, and replacing shower buildings in Iowa’s state parks.

**Lake Restoration and Water Quality.** This appropriation of \$9.6 million for FY 20 not withstands the vertical infrastructure appropriation and funding is used for projects identified in the Lake Restoration Annual Report, with an emphasis on a priority of 35 projects of 127 lakes.

**Water Trails and Low Head Dam Grants.** This appropriation of \$500,000 in FY 20 will go towards grants for local entities for water trail enhancements and dam mitigation grants to dam owners, to improve low head dam safety.

**Facility and Armory Maintenance.** This will be used for the major maintenance projects at all 41 National Guard facilities and armories. The \$1 million appropriation will be used for priority and emergency repairs and then address the backlog of repairs of deferred maintenance.

**Camp Dodge Infrastructure.** The money from this \$250,000 appropriation will be used for improvements at Camp Dodge.

**Statewide Modernization.** An appropriation of \$1 million in FY 20 is matched on a 1 to 1 basis with federal funds. Money is used to accelerate modernization to ensure operational and support facilities to ensure the readiness centers meet the needs of the state for emergencies and US Army missions.

**Network Contract.** This appropriation of \$3.719 million is for the lease purchase payment for the Statewide Interoperable Communication System. This is the third year that the appropriation has been through RIIF, previously being funded through the E911 fund. In 2015 a lease payment was signed with Motorola at an estimated cost of \$39.5 million over 10 years. This is the 4th payment from the state and the final payment is estimated to be in FY 26.

**Lab Liquid Chromatograph.** This is a new appropriation of \$325,000 for the purchase of equipment for toxicology analysis.

**Explosive Trace Detectors.** This is a new appropriation for \$29,000 for a tool that can quickly and efficiently detect explosive materials and items that have been exposed to explosive materials. This tool can improve their response to requests that require the investigation of suspected explosive devices or persons suspected of possessing explosive devices or materials. A lightweight handheld device is easily deployable anywhere in the state and provides quicker assessments of crime scenes and suspected explosive materials.

**Tuition Replacement.** The appropriation replaces student tuition and fees required to pay the debt service on academic revenue bonds authorized by the General Assembly in prior fiscal years. Until FY 2002 the tuition replacement came solely from the general fund. After FY 2002 a portion was funded through the general fund and infrastructure related funds such as RIIF. Since FY 2009 it has been entirely from RIIF.

**Student Innovation Center at ISU.** This is the third year of a planned five year appropriation for the construction of a new Student Innovation Center at Iowa State University.

**Long Hall Renovations at ISD.** This is a new appropriation of \$4.325 million for renovations of Long Hall at the Iowa School for the Deaf.

**4-H Building Remodel.** This bill provides for the State Fair Board will be used for remodeling of the 4-H building on the Iowa State Fairgrounds.

**State Fair Historical Building Planning.** This bill provides \$1 million for the costs associated with the state historical building task force.

**Recreational Trails.** The State Recreational Trails Program (SRT) is used through an application based process. After reviewing applications the Department makes recommendations to the Transportation Commission who has the authority to award funds. The Iowa trail system consists of approximately 1,800 miles including multiuse trails and off road paths. A local match of 25% is required via DOT rules. The bill provides \$2 million in FY 20, an increase of \$1 million over FY 19.

**Public Transit Vertical Infrastructure.** The bill provides \$1.5 million to be used for public transit grants that meet the definition of vertical infrastructure. Grants are for infrastructure-related projects at the 35 public transit agencies throughout the state. The Transportation Commission approves the grants. The projects must meet the definition of vertical infrastructure and the State match is up to 80%. Funds are used for capital projects such as new bus storage buildings, administrative buildings, maintenance facilities, storage buildings, reconstruction of a steam cleaning area, and vehicle storage and wash bays, as well as replacing roofs or other improvements.

**Rail Road Revolving Loan Grant. (RRLG).** The bill provides \$1.5 million for rail road revolving loan grants, and increase of \$500,000. The program is geared toward economic development so many of the grants have gone to construct spur lines that service ethanol and biodiesel plants. Typically the RRLG Program provides loans and grants for rail-related improvements such as developing industrial spur lines and rehabilitation of rail lines. The program has three eligible funding categories that include job creation, rail network improvement, and rail port planning and development. Unlike some other grants in there is no federal money associated with this program.

**Commercial Service Air Vertical Infrastructure Grants.** The bill provides \$2.5 million, a \$1 million increase, for commercial aviation infrastructure. There are 8 commercial airports in the state: Burlington, Cedar Rapids, Des Moines, Dubuque, Fort Dodge, Mason City, Sioux City, and Waterloo. This was funded through the State Aviation Fund last fiscal year. Funds are appropriated in a 50/40/10 formula. A total of \$450,000

will be equally distributed to the airports, \$360,000 will be distributed based on passengers from the previous fiscal year, and the remaining \$90,000 will be distributed based on the tonnage of air cargo from the previous fiscal year.

**General Aviation Vertical Infrastructure Grants.** The bill provides \$1.2 million for General Aviation Infrastructure. Total projects require a minimum of a \$5,000 local match and must meet the definition of vertical infrastructure. Airports applying for a grant apply to the DOT Office of Aviation and are approved by the Transportation Commission.

**ICN Part III Maintenance & Lease Costs.** The \$ 2.7 million appropriation is used for maintenance and lease costs associated with connections for Part III of the ICN. The fiber optic cable for Part III sites is leased from the private sector from the vendors that installed the cable.

**Iowa Public Television (IPTV) Equipment Replacement.** This \$500,000 appropriation will be used to help IPTV for equipment replacement and tower and facility maintenance.

**Data Warehouse.** The appropriation of \$600,000 for FY 20 are used to support the state wide education data warehouse is used with state-wide improvements for education resources and accessibility of the resources. The warehouse is used to create a combined education information system for teachers, parents, administrators, area education agency staff, policymakers, and other staff.

**Criminal Justice.** The CJIS enables and facilitates the automated exchange of criminal justice information among local, State, and federal criminal justice agencies. Funds are used for operation of the System, further development, information technology and network hosting. The bill maintains an appropriation of \$1.2 million.

**Justice Data Warehouse.** The \$157,980 appropriation is used to support the maintenance and hosting costs of the Teradata platform share by the Department of Criminal and Juvenile Justice Planning.

**Online Database.** In 2009 the DOM received a grant of pooled technology funds of \$455,000 and a FY 2011 grant of \$414,000 to initially implement the System. The department has received additional grants for the expansion of IowaGrants.gov to provide a single portal for state agencies. The bill maintains \$45,000 in FY 20.

**Grants Management System.** In 2011 the Legislature passed a requirement that the DOM develop and make available to the public, online searchable database for budget and tax rate information. The databases’ are being developed with DAS and the Department of Revenue. The bill maintains funding of \$70,000 in FY 20.

**Budget and Property Tax Upgrade.** The \$120,000 appropriation will be used to fund the upgrade and redesign of the budget and property tax system used on a yearly basis by local governments to submit information to the Department of Management.

**Other Provisions:**

- The Legislation directs the Department of Administrative Services to prepare an annual report listing any state building that is vacant and submit that report to the legislature.
- Money in the routine maintenance fund must go to projects on state buildings and facilities.
- Effective July 1 2020, if a county renovates or constructs a courthouse the cost of the furnishings will no longer be the sole responsibility of the state.
- Establishes a state historical building task force within the state fair authority. The task force will be one member of the Iowa state fair board, one member of the state fair foundation, one member appointed by the director of the Department of Administrative Services, one member designated by the general assembly as the facility manager of the general assembly, one member appointed by the Department of Cultural Affairs, and one member of each caucus as ex officio members.

The task force will consider the feasibility and costs of establishing a new state historical building museum on the state fairgrounds.
